Have/Has + subject + past participle  Has the environmental engineer ever conducted extensive risk related studies?
Present Perfect Continuous	To describe an activity started in the past and still happening at the time of speaking, or to describe a temporary situation or habits	have/has + been + verb + ing  Example: The IRM engineers have been working on safety protocols.	have/has + not + been + verb + ing  The IRM engineer has not been neglecting noise exposure assessments.	Have/Has + subject + been + verb + ing Example: How long have IRM engineers been focusing on risk identification?

**Note:** You can use the short form: do not = don't, is not = isn't, has not = hasn't, have not = haven't.

Past Continuous	To describe an ongoing action or event in the past.	was/were + verb + ing Safety engineers were reviewing emergency procedures.	was/were + not + verb + ing Safety engineers were not neglecting hazard warnings.	was/were + subject + verb + ing Were industrial hygiene and safety engineers implementing new safety protocols in the past?
Past Perfect Simple	To describe an action completed before another action in the past.	had + past participle Industrial hygiene and safety engineers had completed safety audits.	had + not + past participle  Risk management had not overlooked any risks.	had + subject + past participle  Had safety supervisors completed the safety audit before?
Past Perfect Continuous	To describe an ongoing action that was completed before another point in the past.	had + been + verb + ing Safety coordinators had been analyzing incident reports.	had + not + been + verb + ing  Industrial hygiene and safety engineers had not been neglecting noise exposure assessments.	had + subject + been + verb + ing  How long had risk analysts been assessing workplace hazards?

**Note:** you can use the short form: did not = didn't, was not = wasn't, had not = hadn't, ... etc.
